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LB 1083. That isn't the deal. I agreed, as did other people in this Chamber, to support LB 1083. But I feel that these things should be on the record. These are obstacles in my view of having: A) a smooth transition; B) making sure that those who are now in treatment don't get rushed through the process and inappropriately so. And that brings me, Senator Jensen, to something that I did not talk to you about, but in the...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR TYSON: ...Judiciary Committee, and I don't know the number...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Tyson. I'm sorry. Your time is up. I'm sorry.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Burling.

SENATOR BURLING: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. Began working with this road to recovery project about a year ago now with Senator Jensen and his staff, and I appreciate their willingness to discuss it all this time and I appreciate the cooperation of them since the bill has come to the floor, and also of Dr. Raymond and the people at HHS for working out these amendments and straightening out the kinks in the bill. I've been looking all the time at this proposal and have tried to raise my concerns with Senator Jensen and his staff. They've been very receptive and I appreciate that. And I've also been looking for reasons to support LB 1083 and I've found some good reasons to support it. You know, accessing more federal monies is a good target. Improving behavioral healthcare is something we always...ought to be always trying to do. We don't know, however, depending upon who you talk to, how many patients will qualify for Medicaid, even if they are in a Medicaid-eligible facility, and so I think this project might take longer and cost more money than we have been told up till now because of so many unanswered questions. We don't know how many facilities are going to be needed. We don't know how many patients will qualify for behavioral healthcare. I think we do understand
