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beautiful. He's been doing it for years; let me make them think they're hypocrites. Oh, that...and it gets them, emotion, the sensu thing. I'd better stand up and defend myself. I'm not defending myself. What I'm defending is my ability to stay here. I...you know, there was a movie way back when, some...you know, like "Rudy" or something. It says, Rudy, are you ready for this? I've been ready for this my whole life. Let's stay here and argue and debate about hypocrisy. We can do it all night long. We can be here till 11:59. We've got a lot of time. I think tonight is a late night. Let's do it. The key here is there's some people that trust the citizens, the voters; there's some people that don't. Senator Chambers has laid out a pattern where he honestly believes that the citizens or the voters cannot make conscious decisions like this. If you put something on a ballot, I tend to read it, and I think maybe that 50 to 60, 70 to 80 maybe, percent of the other people probably do, too. If they see this...I've said that I'm not optimistic about the State Fair. I'm not. If they see this on the ballot, they're voting no. And then guess what? Two years from now Senator Chambers might not have forgotten about this but he'll be happy because the State Fair will be dead. Well, guess what? I don't really know that I care if the State Fair lives or dies, and I can look in the mirror and say that's true, and that's not hypocritical. But guess what? Trust in the people or no trust in the people. I believe that he doesn't trust them. I'll let him debate that again until 11:59 and then we'll recess and we'll come back at 12:01, and maybe I'll be laying here on the floor in my own pool of blood. But guess what? I think it will be fun. Senator Beutler told me bats fly around here at night. I want to see it. (Laughter) I want to see it. The people are our CEO. I'm a writer and an editor. I don't know that much about business, but I'll sit here and debate economic theory with you, Senator Chambers. I'll do that till 11:59, too, and I may lose. Guess what? I've looked stupid before, and this is probably one of those instances. I'm not afraid of looking stupid. That's the difference. If we had 48 people stand up and say, I'm not afraid of looking stupid either, he might go away, at least for the time being. Let's give it a shot. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
