Senator Friend, these people are not going to stay here till 11:59, and I know you said it facetiously, but I have been here till 11:59, till midnight, and I was not the one who crumbled first. And I would not be shaking in my knees and quaking or lying in my pool of blood, but you'd see a whole lot of saggy, droopy faces on my colleagues. You'd see red bloodshot eyes in their face. You'd smell John Bar...what is that, Barleycorn...what's his first name? John Barleycorn. Yeah, John Barleycorn would come into this building in demijohns and wind up on the floor of the Legislature in demagogues. I don't need to drink liquor to sustain me. I don't even have to eat. Eating is a sign of weakness. You don't see me running over there to fill my tank with the lobbyists' food. You all do that. That's why I know when Senator Friend in his frustration stands and says that 48 of you all admit you're stupid, or however he phrased it, and that he's willing to stay here until 11:59, I know the rest of you are not, but even if you were, that wouldn't shut me up. I would stay with you because if we spend enough time doing that, we might, we just might, focus our attention on what ought to be a priority. Some people are still wondering whether there is enough to fund the mental health initiative of the Governor, this proposal to look after the welfare of children who might face abuse. I don't see the "Emperor" out there putting something together that the senators jump up and say, well, we might have to do this...
