This chart was...the raw material for this chart was taken from the three...from all of the casinos in Iowa, and this is a chart that shows the estimated revenues raised by those casinos per capita, per capita, by zip code. And you may ask how did they get this information. Well, they have things called players clubs which a large percentage of the people belong to when they go to the casinos, because when they sign up for the players clubs they get some free chips or prizes or whatever, and as part of doing this they write down their name and address and zip code and they also keep a log of their gambling activity while they're there that day. So that's the basis of the underlying information on this chart. And if you look at this chart, you will see that in the Omaha metropolitan area, in Sarpy County and in all of eastern Nebraska revenues are coming in as significantly from the Nebraska side as from the Iowa side. Now, on the Iowa side you see more red, which is the level of the highest per capita revenues coming in, but don't forget that the Omaha counties are more compact and more populated. Of the people who go to the three casinos in Iowa near Omaha, of the people who go there to gamble, according to the records of the casinos themselves, 80...over 83 percent of them are from out of state, and almost all of those are from Nebraska. So Nebraskans are going across the river in large numbers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Those three casinos have total revenues of \$381 million. Eighty percent of that \$381 million, nearly eighty percent of it comes from Nebraskans. With two casinos, basically what we're trying to do is to say we're not going to spread gambling all across Nebraska, but we're going to capture these revenues from Nebraskans who are going across the river to gamble anyway, whether we like it or not. No matter what your moral position is on this, a person at some point has to come to the practical conclusion that tens of thousands of Nebraskans have rejected your moral conclusion and are going across the river to gamble, and that we shouldn't be losing that revenue, and that the people of the state have indicated time and again in larger numbers that they want to vote on this matter.
