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It certainly doesn't smell right. And if he meant something other than what I say, then he ought to make it clear because he said it on the floor in response to a question. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, I'm going to speak to the motion...I mean to the amendment that is before us which proposes two casinos plus the any casinos that would be approved, Native American casinos. And I tend to agree with Senator Wehrbein. If this amendment passes, it will be because of moderates, like Senator Wehrbein, and it will be that the moderates have prevailed; those of us who have been stuck between the people who want to pretend that gambling isn't already here and that it might not even get more pervasive, and those petitions which propose to have it everywhere. And that is why I support AM3572 and I would yield the rest of my time to Senator Beutler if he would like it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, I think we should understand Senator Chambers' admonishment to be sure that there is a full and for...full and fair debate, and I think that's what the proponents are trying to do. But, keep in mind, that since we're on Final Reading, this is a different situation than being on General File. It takes three motions and three votes on three motions to do one amendment. It's a motion to return to Select, the adoption of the amendment, and then the motion to return to Final Reading. So if you have three speakers on each side, it's 18 speakers before you get done with one amendment. If we're trying to deal with four amendments, you're talking about the possibility of 72, 75, 80 speeches. So I hope Senator Chambers will keep in mind that three speakers on each side is really 18 speakers on one amendment. Having said that, I want to go back to that chart on 47 of that handout because I think that's such a telling chart. I want to talk some more about the money that's flowing into Iowa, and I'm going to talk just about the money again and not about the balance between what you win and what you lose in an
