SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SMITH: ...for a few years later, or maybe the very following election cycle. But everywhere else you see one casino, two casino, three casino, four. I think Iowa is up to 10 and they want 12, or something like that. But I did find out that Iowa, maybe they're unreasonable but they are our role models here on the gambling issue, Council Bluffs specifically the role model for Omaha, Iowa demands an eight-year renewal. Maybe Senator Janssen thinks that's unreasonable. I might look at an eight-year renewal. I'd prefer five. I might even be more negotiable on this whole issue than those who would think otherwise. I want to be reasonable, but I certainly want to...
