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rushing people. Senator Aguilar gets up and makes a very impassioned speech about why we should be advancing the racetrack idea, and then he ducks and takes off, and to my knowledge he never called me for help, he never called anyone on that side of this issue for help, and so I'm disappointed that he did withdraw his motion. But I guess I'd like to speak to Senator Friend just briefly, and that is, as I understand what we're actually doing here, we are not doing anything that the public doesn't already have. We are not empowering anybody. You see, our rights are not derived by government. I cannot... I do not grant you rights, Senator Friend. I don't say, here's some rights, they're for you. If that was the case, then I could take away your rights. Now, I can impede on those and I can do things to restrict those. I can't take away the rights that are granted to you in our founding documents. Now, the idea that we're empowering the public to do something, oh, that's right, the first power of the people is to initiate and petition the state of Nebraska or the government. So again, I think you can, you know, you can press your light and that's fine. You can get up and yell and scream all you want. But the fact of the matter is they're already empowered. If they weren't empowered, we wouldn't be talking about this today. Why? Because there's members of this body that is scared to death that they're actually empowered and capable. That's what they're scared of. They're empowered to petition the state and capable of being successful. That's what everybody is scared of. So we as a Legislature have to put something on the ballot that ironically will show no distinguishing characteristics, other than one word in their language that says Legislature, that this is actually the Legislature's idea. So you've got five ideas on the ballot, whether Senator Loudon's amendment gets adopted or not, the people can choose from, assuming that there's 30 of you to do this, to put this on the ballot. Now, I would be intrigued to know whether or not Senator Aguilar is on board, since he seems that this is going down the wrong path, but I would also agree that there is nothing in this constitutional amendment that guarantees Omaha the right for a casino. Fonner Park could be the casino of the state of Nebraska. It very well could be. SouthPointe, which is a fantastic location for most people in Lincoln, could be a location. I mean, it's wide open, based on what the Legislature
