And, Senator Friend: Deep into that darkness peering, long I stood there wondering, peering, fearing, Doubting, dreaming dreams no mortal ever dared to dream before; But the silence was unbroken, and the stillness gave no token, And the only word there spoken was the whispered word, Lenore! This I whispered, and an echo murmured back the word, "Lenore!"...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Merely this, and nothing more. I don't have enough time to go further, and I will not give the entire rhyme...it's...he wrote poems; I write rhymes...this evening because the audience is not sufficiently large, but I was trying to give a little zest to our discussion this evening because I had heard several times everything else, so I thought I would put something new into the pot. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. I would yield my time to Senator Smith.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, you have almost five minutes if you care to use them.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I understand the issues here. Actually, I appreciate the bit of prose Senator Chambers offers. I wish I had that ability to lighten the atmosphere a bit. But I can keep my sense of humor and I am smiling. And I'm feeling pretty good about this issue, because I would imagine that if the votes were there, cloture would have been called awhile ago. And the votes could have been there a lot earlier too, and I'm glad that the ceasing debate hammer or grease gun, whatever you want to call it, seems a bit less frequent than in the beginning. I thank you. But let's talk about the difference. I think the most legitimate discussion we can have here today is the difference between the petitions and the legislative proposal. Yes, both of them must
