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ambiguous it is, at two, but I'm talking about the public at the ballot box. What do you think their reaction will be confronted with, again, competitive ballot issues, one that includes greater Nebraska, one that does not? How is that...could that, and I think it can, negatively impact the viability of our measure that we...in other words, by putting that ceiling and limiting it to basically I think we're talking here metropolitan areas, it may negatively impact the viability of our initiative compared to the initiatives that's being put on through the signature gathering process. As you indicated, people are literally going to these individuals that are collecting the signatures, knowing...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...knowing full well that it includes the machines in bars and so forth.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time is up.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Did you say time, Senator?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I did, Senator.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Synowiecki. Senator Louden, on your motion to return.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I think Senator Schimek mentioned something about leadership and that if there wasn't a number on there, there would be utter chaos and that sort of thing, and myself, I have a lot more faith in the future legislators that will probably sit in this Chamber. I think if you can look back to this ethanol deal that we had convulsions about for three days, you might say, somebody back several years ago put certain numbers of ethanol plants in there. They also put the amount that needed to be generated or manufactured out of these plants low enough so that people could
