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will have to do an update before you change. So I would advise people who are making a nutrient management plan that they make it fairly broad and meet the requirements of the law so that they have adequate acres, so they aren't overapplying. But if there is a change, if you're going to deviate from that, then you have to file an application for the change.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Otherwise we don't have to do anything annually?

SENATOR SCHROCK: The report has to be there filed annually, but if there's no change it shouldn't be a problem, it shouldn't be a big issue because you'll just file what you had the year before.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: So it is the responsibility of myself or the owner of a livestock feeding operation or livestock control waste handling facility to report this on an annual basis. That's just another duty of the operation then?

SENATOR SCHROCK: But I think it's going to be fairly automatic, Senator Stuthman, because you're going to pay an annual fee, and I'm sure that's going to coincide with updating of your plans and so on and so forth. So it shouldn't be burdensome. It shouldn't be a lot of trouble.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Okay. These annual fees will be...will be just an automatic billing, right, or will they...

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes. Yes, that is correct.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: ...will you have to make an application again?

SENATOR SCHROCK: That is correct.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: So if I've got 1,000 head, it will be \$100 a year every year. But if I decide that my operation is only...only has, in the last five years, only 600 head in, I could reduce my number to 600 head and then my permit would only be for 600 head and billed \$60.
