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that he or she pleases. A senator can, meaning has the power by virtue of being a senator, and may, which means that nothing inappropriate is being done. A senator can and may offer a bill that says the Legislature shall begin each day by reciting "The Lord's Prayer," some version of it, or whatever designation those words are known by.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President, and could include all of those words, even though when it comes to that, by the way, there are different versions. So there is not a single or unitary "Lord's Prayer," just as there is not a single or unitary version of the Ten Commandments. So when people use those terms, you have to ask them which version do you mean, and I don't mean different versions in different versions of the Bible, but different versions in the New Testament of the same Bible, the Old Testament when it comes to the Ten Commandments of the same "Bible." Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on the Chambers amendment, FA1613, to the committee amendments to LB 958. Open for discussion. There were several lights on from the last bill. If you wish to be recognized for this one, why, just tell me. Senator Engel, did you wish to address the Chambers amendment? I do not see Senator Engel. Senator Engel, did you wish to address the Chambers amendment? Followed by Senator Erdman and Stuhr and others.

SENATOR ENGEL: I yield my time to Senator Foley.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you, Senator Engel. I said much of what I felt I needed to say in my opening, so I won't take much of that time but I appreciate having it. Again, the concept that I've offered here today is really quite simple. It simply relates to protection of an unborn child outside of the context of abortion. I suspect, with some regret, that Senator Chambers' position on the abortion question and mine can never be reconciled, and I would...I live in hope and perhaps some day
