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SENATOR FRIEND: Please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...just so we can be accurate in what we're saying, and I know what your opinion is, legislation is enacted by a legislative body.

SENATOR FRIEND: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Courts give opinions interpreting and construing constitutions and laws and it is not legislation.

SENATOR FRIEND: Correct. Thank you, Senator, but my feeling is...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR FRIEND: ...that that's what the courts did; they legislated. So I...I mean...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you express it that way, I understand what you're saying.

SENATOR FRIEND: Okay. And I guess I'm going to give you some time here because I know you've run out, but what...I guess what I wanted to get at, and I can finish this.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FRIEND: I've got my light pushed. All this aside, the fact that I agree and have learned to feel the same way that some of the others have spoken feel about this issue, I also feel that we've achieved this point through some very dubious means, I guess, dubious judicial means over the last, you know, 25-30 years. I'd like to encroach back, away from those type of dubious means. I think the legislative process has been stolen away. I've got my button pushed. I'd like you to speak to a little bit of this. And I know...I'm not calling anybody else out, but I know people that have a heck of a lot more experience dealing with this stuff than me, but the general feeling coming from my side is I'd like to encroach back. I'd like us to go
