creep back in the other direction, and I'm not hiding that from anyone. And if we can do that with a bill like this legislatively, I think it's totally legitimate.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Time, Senator Friend. Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Beutler, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, Senator Foley, I would like to engage you in a little conversation, if we could, Senator Foley.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley, would you respond to a question from Senator Beutler?

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Foley, I want to...I want to explore a little bit the consistency of your thought and how you react to basically an assertion that it's not consistent in every respect, and ask you why it's not consistent, and in doing that I want to indicate to you that I very much appreciate the fact that in everything you've done in this Legislature I've considered your world view very catholic, and I mean that with a small C, that is universal. I admire the way you've tried to, I think, be consistent in your world view, and I mean that sincerely. In this particular case, what I wanted to ask about is that in Section 4 and in Section 5 you say a person, meaning all persons, commits an offense if you do certain things, both with regard to assault in the first degree and with regard to assault in the second degree. It applies to all persons, as it should, because you're conceptualizing the unborn child, essentially for purposes of the law, as another person. Then we come down to line 18 on page 2 and there you say the assault of an unborn child does not apply to a particular person, to the mother of the unborn child, and that, to me, in a strictly intellectual sense, is totally inconsistent. And in fact, if you look at the example of what we've argued for domestic abuse, for example, we've argued that the domestic relationship is a higher and to be better protected relationship because of its importance. And so this year in this Legislature we've considered higher penalties for assaults in domestic relations
