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you've taken the approach that I've taken. One is the moral and the philosophical view. Two is the fact that we're driving down a road...we've driven down a road judicial...the second one is we've driven down a road judicially where we shouldn't go when we...and the third is we've driven down a road legislatively that we shouldn't go, meaning, as far as I'm concerned, that we're...that before a decision and, hence, the implication of Roe v. Wade, the states were able to make decisions like this on their own. That's all we're trying to do legislatively, and Senator Foley's bill is a logical, as Senator Maxwell pointed out, a logical extension of that. We have federally encroached on some of these powers. That's all I was getting at. And my feeling is the stronger I can get in that pragmatic or legal area, the more well-equipped I will be to chop up a person like my infamous "Field Marshal Rommel," standing to my left. He can have the rest of my time. Senator Chambers, I don't know how much is left.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you have about two, two, two.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Two, two seconds?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Two minutes and twenty-two seconds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Now it's 20 and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I want to emphasize again that my point of departure is the woman. When the state, when male-dominated legislatures begin to encroach on the life and the decisions of women, I think that's wrong. Either there are not enough women in legislatures, or they're not strong enough alone to withstand this onslaught against them, which has always occurred. I'm going to lend my voice to their cause. This bill is not going to go anywhere. When Senator Maxwell said it's a logical extension of what has been going on, and then Senator Friend underscored that, I would agree. It's a logical extension of an illogical process. What Senator Foley and those before him have persuaded the
