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that, but why doesn't he include the mother? After all, if you follow the line that life begins at a certain point that's identified by right-to-life folks, then if you really believe that you ought to include the mother in this bill. Otherwise, you're being inconsistent and you're being pragmatic and you're giving consideration to the interest of the woman. Why would you do it in one case and then criticize others when they do it on a broader scale? I have trouble in an intellectual sense understanding that, even though I recognize that there are degrees of everything. But let me move on to a different question, if I may, Senator Foley. And again, if I could, Senator Foley, I would like to exchange ideas with you a little bit. And Senator Foley is...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...engaged in conversation, so maybe I'll just...I may just have time to lay out the idea and ask him to respond on his own time anyway. But the idea is basically this. In the...in the operative provisions of the bill, it says that a person commits first-degree, second-degree assault of an unborn child if he intentionally or knowingly, in the case of first degree, causes serious bodily injury to an unborn child. The words "intentionally or knowingly" are a little bit vague in this instance because does it require that you know of the existence of the pregnancy or not? And in my opinion, that particular provision should contain the language that the offense is committed if the person has knowledge of the pregnancy; that otherwise, given the invisibility of the person in this case,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...one ought to, before charging them with a knowingly...knowing assault, be sure that they understood that they knew that there was an unborn child existent. Likewise, on second-degree assault and the reckless causing of serious bodily injury, it seems to me that also in that case the measure of recklessness ought to relate to knowledge on the person's part of the pregnancy. And, Senator Foley, there's hardly any time left here now, but I would ask you, when you have an opportunity
