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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can I make clear what I was saying, because I don't...

SENATOR FOLEY: Please do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What I was saying is that when I offer a bill to abolish the death penalty there are no exceptions. Nobody should be executed. I said but for those who are supporting this bill, they are not willing to protect all unborn human life. If it exists outside the womb, they don't want to protect that. If it exists in the uterus, then they will protect it. That's what I said. I was not saying that if you supported one rather than the other there was anything hypocritical about that.

SENATOR FOLEY: I see. I didn't quite...I didn't quite understand that. I appreciate the clarification. And I don't think this bill says that we don't want to protect unborn life outside of life in utero. This bill just says for purposes for this legislation that's as far as we're going to go. If you care to respond, Senator Chambers, you're welcome to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. Here's what I'm getting at...

SENATOR FOLEY: You seemed a little upset by my answer.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, here's what I'm getting...no, I'm shocked, stunned, amazed and surprised, quite frankly. Your faith does not hold to the notion that morality is relative, that there are absolutes, and based on the position you've taken, it's an absolute conviction of yours that all human beings should be protected, and you believe that a human being exists at the point of conception. So I cannot fathom how, because conception occurs in vitro or in a vessel outside the womb, that that fertilized egg is not a human being. You don't say that; you say it is. So I don't see how you can say that should not be protected, that human being, simply because of its geographic location.

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, putting aside for a moment matters of
