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SENATOR CHAMBERS: So born and viable are different.

SENATOR FRIEND: Okay, let me ask you one final question.
Senator Erdman is standing next to you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Punch him.

SENATOR FRIEND: You don't know...I don't even...help me understand, and I'm sure your light is pushed, help me understand why, other than the fact that you think a zygote is not a human being, that if I didn't see you standing there, because you haven't answered this question and you're not going to do it on my time either, help me explain why, if I ran on over to Senator Erdman right now, according to this bill that I supposedly don't understand, why would it be a crime for me to take him out, and if I hit you, it's not a crime for me taking you out too. I mean I think...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, because they feel differently about Senator Erdman than they do...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...about me.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Friend. (Visitors introduced.)
On with discussion of FA1614, Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you, Mr. President. I wonder if Senator Chambers would yield to some additional conversation.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.
