SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...but the fetus did.

SENATOR FOLEY: Maybe we should narrow it down then to medications or pharmaceuticals that may be legal but for her, in her condition of pregnancy, it would be medically inadvisable.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It would have to have been established that this is a substance which is going to result in this type of a condition and, therefore, it was illegal to be administered by anybody unless the person who is going to take it had a doctor's prescription and had gotten the substance legally.
