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a moment in time in this session where the best instincts of all parties were about to achieve a really outstanding result which only somebody in the body can appreciate. And I'm asking everybody, because everybody has done such an outstanding job with regard to the totality of this, I'm asking everybody to call upon their best selves to take a deep breath and see if we can't save this moment and its result. Today what you've had are two adversaries, two competing points of view, having an extraordinarily civil and appropriate discourse about their diametrically opposed points of view. The Speaker, in the exercise of his office, had intervened. There were quid pro quos. All quid pro quos don't have to be spread on the record. This bill couldn't move without cloture or the withdrawal of amendments. This bill, in my judgment, can't go three rounds in the remainder of this session. So what had been facilitated by the Speaker with the full, complete participation and total cooperation of Senators Chambers and Foley were a quid pro quo that said there will be a vote. And the bill will take its normal place in relationship to what is, and the agenda is under the control of the Speaker and will always be, and he'll exercise that control and we will go where we go, and in return for the movement today, we were going to facilitate other people's participation in the process, their opportunity to speak on their subjects, but then we were going to be able to deal substantively with Senator Mossey's bill, which many people care about. He's not here. I'm only speaking as certainly as I am because he asked me to handle the bill for him. He's not here. Senator Chambers has labored...labored to rewrite that bill. He and I have cooperated. That bill is a good piece of legislative work which Senator Chambers supports. We hope you do. I do, so on and so forth, so we could get to that, move that, and then the Vrtiska bill, which also comes out of the Judiciary Committee and is prepared for you and has had the participation of your Judiciary Committee staff, Senator Chambers' complete consultation, it was also ready to move. And it was just a wonderful achievement based on reality, cooperation, collegiality, and everything else, as I saw it. I thought it was really going to be an extraordinary moment and the only reason I threw this recommit up is because it was the only thing I could think to do, was to get on the mike and tell you these are the intricacies of the process and how it works.
