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and the Chief Justice and all those people regarding security policy within the State Capitol. Now who would have the last say? Would that be the State Patrol and some of the professionals that are involved with security and that type of thing, or would this be left up to some of the heads of some of these departments to decide how the security was going to be arranged? Is that the correct way to go about stating this about who has the authority to make the decisions?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, I think we have to leave it with the security people to have authority to make the decision, Senator, but I feel entirely comfortable with this paragraph because it indicates that they'll consult with the Governor, the Chief Justice, and the Executive Board of the Legislative Council, and the State Capitol Administrator regarding policy within the State Capitol and the Capitol grounds. So I don't have any doubt but that everybody is going to have proper input into security, and I think it's appropriate that the security people are ultimately...if we're going to make them responsible, they have to be in charge.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Then you feel that line 9 there about "shall be the responsibility of the Nebraska State Patrol," you think that's sufficient enough to give the State Patrol then the authority to have the last say in security of the State Capitol Building?

SENATOR BEUTLER: I think so, Senator.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Okay. Well, other than when I find out where the Historical Society Building is, because my understanding is they have their own type of security system there and their own people, and I've...was kind of concerned whether the State Patrol is going to take over the security of the Historical Society or whether they go with their own people. So I guess when I get that question answered then I'll know how I'll vote for this amendment. Thank you, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Louden. I see no further
