emergency situation with an asthmatic attack or some such ailment. I'm hoping you're remembering this as I see it, or as I say it. The intent of this amendment would be to provide for a limited amount of time, just it's a sunset of July 1 of 2005, immunity for those persons who are designated and trained by the school to perform this function. The reason for the sunset or deadline is that it's our belief that this properly should be brought next session in the form of a bill, and it likely would be then referred to the Judiciary Committee, which is quite capable of handling these sorts of issues, and a thorough analysis of it could be done. This is meant to be a temporary protection for those teachers or other school employees who are asked to perform this duty. So again, I think...I think the language we have here is agreed upon. I would ask your support to return. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, you're recognized to close on your motion. He waives closing. The question then is, shall LB 868 be returned to Select File for amendment? All in favor vote aye, and opposed nay. Please record.

CLERK: 37 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to return.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President and members. Again, I would urge your adoption. The amendment dealing with immunity for those designated to perform emergency services for students, temporary only until July 1 of 2005. Thank you.
