SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler and Senator Raikes. I see no further lights on. Senator Raikes, you're recognized to close. And he waives. The question is the adoption of AM3551. All in favor say (sic) aye, opposed nay. Vote aye or vote nay. Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the Select File amendment.

SPEAKER BROMM: The amendment is adopted. Do we have anything further on the bill? Senator Mossey.

SENATOR MOSSEY: Mr. Speaker, I move the advancement of LB 868 to E & R for engrossing.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Redfield, you're recognized on your motion.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members of the body, when you register a child for kindergarten, you are expected to bring with you an original birth certificate with the seal. You're also supposed to submit their Social Security number. When you apply to attend a public college, you, on the application, must submit your Social Security number. But we protect those documents from the public eye in our public records law, and that is found in Section 84-712. We in fact are very, very careful and amended that law just recently, two years ago, to make sure that we are protecting those Social Security numbers from the eye of those who might want to take advantage of our students and steal their identity. We have a number of records that we collect as a government, and we want to make sure that we do protect the public. We do not collect the records for students for private school students. They
