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remain in the private schools and we are not the depositories of those records so, in fact, we don't have to worry about protecting them. But there is one other category that, in fact, we do collect records for that we have discovered within our body of law that we do not have any protection for. And I will explain to you that actually we had a request in the state of Nebraska to release the records for the home school students in our state. And I had a conversation with Mr. Inbody over at the Department of Education last week, and I was certain that we had protected those records, and as we worked our way through the law together, we in fact discovered that there is a hole there that does not protect those records. So he sent over language to me today that I just received this morning, and it is before you in amendment and it would add a section to the subsection (1) of the public records law that only deals with personal information of these students. What is that personal information? Where we're talking about their birth certificate, their date of birth, their maiden...mother's maiden name, Social Security number, which in fact we have protected very clearly in subsection (16) that we added two years ago. But I am asking that you might consider whether in fact we want to make sure that this...these documents that we do hold in the public trust are protected for the sake of the students. And I would ask for your return to Select File and advancement of the amendment. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Redfield. Senator Raikes, on the motion to return.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. Senator Redfield, I wanted to ask you a question, if I could.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Redfield, would you yield please?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Maybe you said and I didn't catch it, but why...my question is about the timing of this. We really haven't heard about this one before. Why...why does this come up now?
