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struggling with the language in this amendment, to be quite honest with you. If Senator Redfield would yield to a question or two.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: Senator Redfield, I appreciate what you're trying to do, but I'm reading the amendment and it says that, basically, personal information in records regarding a student, prospective student, or former student of any, and you strike "tax-supported," educational institution, then you strike "maintaining the records," or exempt school that has effectuated an election not to meet state approval or accreditation requirements pursuant to a certain section, 79-1601, when such records are maintained by and in the possession of a public entity. Section 79-1601 only deals with private, denominational, or parochial schools, so unless you're saying that a home, in the case of a home school student, meets the definition of "educational institution," I'm struggling as to how this is going to accomplish what you want.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Home school does not come under the category of tax-supported educational institution, as the wording was originally, but it does come under the language exempt school that has effectuated an election not to meet state approval under Section 79-1601. That's the current language for home school.

SENATOR BOURNE: Sure, but as I scan 1601, 79-1601, it only deals with private, denominational, or parochial schools, and so necessarily you would have to be saying that a home is either an educational institution, a private school, a denominational school, or a parochial school. Is that accurate?

SENATOR REDFIELD: I believe that this is the section that does home school, and I don't have the section in front of me, but that's what the Department of Education gave me as the section they have home school category under.
