CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to return.

SPEAKER BROMM: The bill is returned. Senator Redfield, to open on AM3669. And she waives. Is there any discussion? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, as with reference to the statutory cite, I'm not going to get into that, but I want to ask Senator Redfield a question for clarification.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Redfield, would you yield?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes, I would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Redfield, I didn't have a chance to hear everything you said, but would you list...I think there were four items that you told me would qualify as the personal records of the student who is involved.

SENATOR REDFIELD: It would be their birth certificate, their date of birth, the mother's maiden name, and Social Security number, which is also protected in subsection (16).

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, since Senator Redfield showed me which records are to be protected and they relate to the child, I cannot find any fault with the amendment and I'm going to support it. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Redfield, I see no further lights. You're recognized to close on your amendment, Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to thank everyone for taking the time to do this, and I hope you advance the amendment. Thank you.
