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the scrutiny that a bill normally receives during General File, no opportunity by people to scrutinize it and possibly amend it. I'm not saying that it may not be good legislation. I'm saying that I don't know that it's good legislation, and that I have not had time to consider beyond my first impression, which I received from testimony. Only two people testified besides the introducer, Senator Chambers. One was a gentleman from the Commission on Public Advocacy in support of this, the other one was the Lancaster County Deputy Attorney. This may be good legislation. I don't know that. I think that our process of the committee hearing, the General File, the Select, gives us an opportunity to consider a very, very serious matter. Now it may be that a man is guilty. Okay. He may be innocent. There may be exculpatory evidence to prove that. In the meantime, the Supreme Court has spoken and given a ruling that allows an avenue for appeal. Granted, it does have a cut-off date which is the three-year bar that Senator Chambers spoke of. I think that this is a serious enough matter that, if Senator Chambers feels that this is a serious thing, and he does, he will be here next January and he can start the process, and this can be given the consideration that it needs. I think coming in on the fifty-eighth day and abbreviating the process does not serve the public interest and, on that basis, I intend to vote not to return it on Select File. If you judge otherwise, I'm going to vote against the amendment and, if the amendment passes, I will vote against the bill. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Senator Chambers, motion to return.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I will not be here when the festivities take place just before sine die takes effect, so that being the case, I want to say a few words about my soon-to-be ex-colleague, Gene Tyson. When Senator Tyson came down here, people thought he and I would clash, that we would disagree on everything, that he was so hidebound, so conservative that he squeaked when he walked, that his mind was absolutely closed, as you could tell by looking at the expression that he usually carried on his face, which even he will agree is sour most of the time. But you cannot judge a book by its cover, nor can you deal with a person based on the
