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being. We also reviewed your request--and the rest is about the exemption under the public records law. That is really the pertinent aspects of the Attorney General's findings.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: The part that is attempting to be amended right now is the language that the NEOC asked for, because they wanted to restrict the availability of copies to circumstances where there was no aggrieved party or where the aggrieved party were testers or a testing organization. So that in the case where it wasn't an individual who knew what had happened, but a circumstance where it was a tester and the individual, the respondent would need to have the information on which to act, either to determine whether to conciliate or to act in terms of how they manage the people that have...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BROWN: ...caused these actions,...thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Bourne, on the motion to return.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I think, with all respect to Senator Chambers and other members in the body, I guess we're at the point in the session where we're tired of hearing one another argue about bills, and we're just ready to go forward. But I'll tell you, I'm not sure that we should go forward, Senator Brown. I have the same letter that you do from the ACLU that Senator Chambers handed out, saying that we could risk \$500,000 in HUD funds if the bill goes through. And it says something about, Nebraska has to have a substantial equivalence review following any amendment, which could lead to a HUD decertification. Doesn't say that it will lead to that, but it says it could. And I'm concerned about the \$500,000, especially when I look at what the bill actually does. And as I read the Final Reading copy of LB 625, it basically allows the respondent--and I assume that's a person who owns a home, who is renting it out--to obtain information regarding the investigation, at any time, upon request. That's what it
