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the balance of my time if you care to have it.

SENATOR BROWN: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: This bill was introduced 18 months ago. And only one individual testified against it in the committee. We addressed that individual's concerns by virtue of redacting the names of the testers, so that in any information that went out, the names of the testers could be...would be redacted so that their identity would not be jeopardized. I do not believe that HUD will decertify us, any more than they might based on what we already have in our state law, which says that any time, upon request, we must turn over this information. But even if they were to have a hearing and it looks like that there's a possibility of decertification, we would have...generally, federal agencies would give...if there's a problem with statute, will give the state a year to have another opportunity to have a session and bring it up again for reconsideration. And I pledge that if there were a situation like that, I would be the first to be offering a bill to change it. I believe, as I've said before, that it is for the very reasons...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...that...of what Senator Maxwell said and what Senator Chambers has so eloquently talked about. We are talking about technicalities around a broader issue. But if we don't provide information so that the people that own companies can cause their employees' behaviors--behaviors, not attitudes, but behaviors--to change, then I don't think that we are doing our job. And all we are doing with this bill is clarifying what we already have in state law. I think that after 18 months, after the bill has been up on Final Reading three times, that we have discussed...and after having incorporated the very language that the NEOC asked for, and that's what is being proposed to be changed here, I'm not sure what else can be done. But I do...

SENATOR CUDABACK: It's now your time, Senator Brown.
