statement by white people. There's no racism, because it doesn't happen to them. On the other hand, black people have a very, what would be described, pessimistic view of the whole thing, because we're the ones it happens to. I'm not going to mention everything that has happened to me, not just one time, at the hands of white people, not just one time. I could mention additional instances of racism at Creighton University. Everyplace I've ever gone where white people were in charge, racism is found. If you look in either the Omaha World-Herald or the Lincoln paper, you see where they've got a big article about the racism in the Chicago Fire Department, and the use of the "N"-word on their radios. And when there was a group investigating the Omaha police and reviewing them, the "N"-word was used in the police cars in front of these people who were judging them to see whether or not the Omaha Police Department should be certified. They have no shame, they have no worry, because their attitude is that white people stick together. And my experience is that they do. They swallow everything and pretend not to see what is in front of their eyes, not to hear what their ears tell them. You all know there are jokes told around here that would never be told in front of me, but you'll all deny it. But you don't know what my sources of information are. But I don't bring that up all the time, because white people are going to be white people. I know that. I've been in this world 65 going on 66 years. I've been around white people all of my life. I've never had a black teacher. When I was mistreated, it was at the hands of a white teacher, white principal, white counselors. But you all don't believe it. You say I'm imagining it. You say black people imagine racism because they see it everywhere. Then you take a microbiologist and let him look under a microscope, and you'll say he's seeing things because he sees microbes everywhere. Well, he sees them because they're there. You all have an easy life, and you tend to look at everybody else's situation through your experiences. If I dealt with everybody on this floor based on the way I've been treated by some white people, I'd be cussing you all out all the time. And I wouldn't have one incident that I would say, now that soured my whole view; on the basis of that one incident I'm voting a certain way on a bill which I probably shouldn't vote that way on; it may be a good justification, it may not be. I've got to be bigger than you all. I've got to be
