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there, part of his IPP, individual program plan, was that he is to have 24/7 visual surveillance. Wasn't there. Really a breakdown in the staffing or in the system. And by the way, that's being investigated by HHS as well as even the police report is not totally complete, very near complete, however. So we saw a circumstance that perhaps the staffing was not correct and we'll examine that. During the interim, I would like to have an interim study that we look at all group homes across the state, Senator Beutler, and I think that's very apropos. We have, however, rights by those individuals with developmental disabilities, as we have rights for those people with mental illness,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...and we can't really impede on those rights, but we can certainly look at how we work with that system and with the group homes, and so I think that we can work to do that. I do frankly think, however, that LB 1083 will offer an array of services that we haven't had before, step-down services, wraparound services. We have a commission, an Oversight Commission, that's going to follow through until 2008 to see that we have a system that is working. And, yes, I'm sure that we'll bring back follow-up legislation, not only next year but the year after, to ensure that we have a system that is working. But I absolutely believe that LB 1083 is not the...is the answer and not the problem. I think that we can develop some programs that we're all going to be proud of in the future. We can learn from this experience. And it's only by this body's diligence that we can develop a system that is better, and that is certainly my goal.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR JENSEN: It's a goal of LB 1083. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jensen. (Visitors introduced.)
