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the ones that paid the price for lapsed supervision, or for an erroneous diagnosis by a doctor, or because somebody went off their medication temporarily because somebody forgot to watch to see that they took their pill. That's what they're concerned about. And I think that this whole idea of the least restrictive environment and some of the principles that we use are difficult to carry out in fact, and we need to think about ways whereby the children of a neighborhood are not the ones who pay the price for the various shortcomings of human nature and scientific knowledge. Maybe homes, for example, that have certain types of particularly unpredictable people should be in a rural setting instead of in the middle of a neighborhood. And I think Senator Jensen has talked about the fact that engineers and designers are beginning to construct different kinds of facilities now that are more secure or have types of security devices that are more reliable. We need to engage those technologies.

SENATOR JONES: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But, Senator, I don't think I'm going to talk again, Senator Jensen. You have the votes for this bill. I'm going to vote no and I'm going to vote no because I want to send a strong signal to a part of the community that we're going to look at this safety, public safety aspect of everything that's going on over the next year or two, and I intend to be one of the persons that tries to deal with this in a constructive but realistic way. Thank you.

SENATOR JONES: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Next speaker, Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, I'd yield my time to Senator Beutler.

SENATOR JONES: Senator Beutler, you have about five minutes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Cudaback (sic), Senator Brown, thank you. As I look over these notes, I think I've brought to the attention of the body, I think we have brought to the attention of the body all of those things that were the principal concerns
