ASSISTANT CLERK:      (Record vote read, Legislative Journal pages 1648-1649.)      The vote is 46 ayes, 0 nays, 1 present and not voting, 2 excused and not voting, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      LB 826 passes. Madam Clerk, LB 826A, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK:      (Read LB 826A on Final Reading.)

SENATOR CUDABACK:      All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 826A pass? All in favor of the motion vote aye; those opposed to the motion vote nay. Have you all voted who wish to? Record please, Madam Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK:      (Record vote read, Legislative Journal pages 1649-1650.)      The vote is 46 ayes, 0 nays, 1 present and not voting, 2 excused and not voting, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      LB 826A passes. Madam Clerk, LB 479E.

ASSISTANT CLERK:      Mr. President, the first motion I have with respect to LB 479 is a motion from Senator Beutler. He would move to return the bill to strike the enacting clause.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      Senator Beutler, to open on your motion, as stated by the Clerk.

SENATOR BEUTLER:      Senator Cudaback, this is the third Baker bill that we've come upon. As I've traveled down the agenda and hit these Baker bills, I feel like I need to post a Burma-Shave sign. (Laughter) You would think Senator Baker would be entirely satisfied with the results of this day, being able to celebrate three of his bills being passed, and that he would forego beating a dead horse by filing that presumptuous resolution, LR 400. But it is arguably relevant to this bill, which is about tax credits, because I could at least give Senator Baker credit for being taxing with his resolution. With that, I'd withdraw it, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK:      It is withdrawn. The first vote will be to
