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Fair. It seems to me I won't be pressing for General Fund appropriations. I won't be asking for money from a source. I won't be down in the Appropriations Committee saying,...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...oh, but please could I have some General Fund money because the public will have told me what they think. I will have been able to read the tea leaves. The last point that I want to conclude into making and that is none of the other priorities, the compulsive gambling, the education, or the natural resources, disagrees. In fact, they support the idea of a constitutional amendment because it enshrines those priorities in the constitution. The NSE supports this idea. The national, I'm sorry, the Nebraska Education...Environmental Trust Fund supports this idea. The compulsive gamblers support this idea so long as it recites current obligations and puts them in the constitution. They are not competitors with this idea. They rather like the idea of taking what was a public decision and putting it into the constitution consistent with what was originally done when the lottery was passed with this emendation--if the public will allow it. And if they won't, that's fine. We go back to where we are now...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...with a very clear signal as to where the public stands on the State Fair, a very usable piece of information come budgeting time, come General Fund time...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...in this body.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Don Pederson.
