to them and they can decide what ought to be done. We are supposed to be the decision makers. I'd venture to say if I read the campaign literature of my colleagues they would all talk about what they intend to do, not what they intend to avoid doing, not what they intend to buck to the public and say, I will let the public decide whether something ought to be done about this or that because there is a lot of sentimental attachment to this. I just read this morning what Senator Mossey said he intends to do and not one thing related to bucking something to the public so that he wouldn't have to make the decision. I didn't see that in the article about him. The World-Herald doesn't do articles about people running in other parts of the state. That's why I have to say I would venture to say that none of you put in your campaign literature the statement that you're not going to make decisions, that you're going to buck them to the public. You don't do that. This State Fair is not essential to the life, the well-being of this state. This State Fair should not be given this priority over every other branch of government,...

SENATOR JANSSEN PRESIDING

SENATOR JANSSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...every other agency of government, every department, everything. You're elevating the State Fair above all of that and in order to keep it located as far away from the rural and farm interest as is possible unless it was located in Omaha. Thank you, Mr. President.
