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all of us essentially, is the State Fair more important than higher education, and Senator Brashear said, as I would say, no, it's not. In fact, we fund education and higher education with \$1.3 billion and we fund, this Legislature funds the State Fair at \$150,000. We spend \$1,300,000,000 for education and \$150,000 for State Fair. Can't accuse this body of having a warped sense of priority on that basis it seems to me. By the way, that's the pot of money that we have, we control, and was given to us by taxpayers. The lottery pot is different. It's not given to us by taxpayers. It's not taxes. It's donations. It's donations put into a special pot by people who choose to play the lottery when we said to those people, if you choose to play the lottery, this is how we're going to spend that pot of money. Didn't say it was a tax dollar, didn't say it was the General Fund. Medicaid, we spend \$600 million on Medicaid and every dollar is worth it. I happened to do it myself, raise taxes many times to do it, didn't raise taxes this year, and I'll address that, Senator Chambers, because I think that's part of the point that you're making. What this does is it elevates education to the constitution for the donation money of the lottery. It elevates the environment to the constitution for the lottery money, which is donation money, and it also elevates the State Fair on the basis of a donation through the lottery mechanism for people who choose to play the lottery, who don't give us money for tax dollars, but who choose to play the lottery. Can we use the money for this purpose, yes or no? Say yes, fine, we will. Say no, we'll understand what that means. That's different than tax dollars. We...I think it's a fair question to say what about leaders who choose not to ask and I think there's a veiled reference there perhaps to me, as the Revenue Chairman, because I didn't lead a tax increase charge this year, even though I support a number of, several of the tax increases, and even though over time we'll clearly need to do so. I will tell you as briefly as I can I think raising taxes has to be done at a time and in the condition in which the public understands and accepts. We've done it twice in recent years. I think we have strained the public, but we have not broken their faith. They've understood because the times were tough. This year without the bill due and owing for the nuclear low-level waste, without it due and owing, I think the chance of breaking faith with the public was very great. And I thought
