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million Africans were killed in Rwanda. At the same time Jews and white people were trumpeting never again for Jews, hundreds of thousands of Rwandans were dying. SENATOR LANDIS: One minute, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think you could get \$5 billion a month out of the federal government for education? Could you get \$5 billion a month out of the federal government for anything that went to human uplift? Certainly not. Where is that money being spent? It's being spent with corporations that are providing services and doing things that this government says are necessary to carry out whatever it is they say they're doing in Iraq, so that's the President's friends, Halliburton and that ilk.
