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except to perhaps mislead some people who don't understand how programs are funded. We could write a law, a bill, and it could be passed into law and signed by the Governor, or if the Governor, exercising prudence, vetoed it, we could override it, which would say, every citizen in Nebraska shall be given \$1 million January 1, 2005, and they'd think they've got that money. But there is no A bill to appropriate it. So passing a statute does not carry with it the money needed to fund it. So you just have made people think that they're all rich, but they got nothing. And I think we ought to do it, give them something to hope for and hold on to, until reality sets in. When they buy these lottery tickets, what happens? But we're not even making them give us a dollar. We're just giving them something to make them feel good temporarily, as so much of the legislation that we pass does--makes people feel good. This bill merely draws the battle lines. The battle comes when you try to get some money to fund it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When we adopt this amendment, I believe the Legislature will be conducting itself in a way that is responsible, that is prudent. We will be taking from the law words that never should have been put there. Taking these words out of Senator Janssen's bill will have no effect whatsoever on what he's trying to do. Leaving it in will have no effect whatsoever on what he's trying to do. What taking these words out will accomplish is the vindication of our system of legislating. So I'm going to support Senator Janssen's amendment, because he has brought me to a realization that what he's doing is wise and appropriate.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Janssen, there are no further lights on, wishing to speak. Did you wish to close on FA9?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. I believe everyone who is paying attention understands what we're doing. We're taking: the amount of tuition credits granted shall not exceed nine hundred thousand dollars in any fiscal year. We're removing that from this section. With that, I ask for your
