SENATOR SCHIMEK: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...only have...I know how to get Senator Thompson here. I know my children. All I have to do is refer to something dear to one of my children, and my child will come, all of my children. Members of the Legislature, as this bill stands, there is no requirement that any person receive even the 75 percent that they receive now. So there is nothing in this bill that tells you how much any person in the National Guard will receive by way of tuition assistance. This is one reason I said that although I voted against Senator Thompson's amendment, it's better than putting in there a flat 100 percent. This is, literally, a sliding scale upwards from nothing to 100 percent, and that would obviously include anything in between. What my amendment is designed to do is to open the discussion on whether or not you think that this public money should go to support schools that are not public. If it is believed by my colleagues that the state has enough money in the public school budgets, then you can reject my amendment and then I will cut this much out of the university's budget. Now not only am I telling you that I will go at the budget, but I'm giving my whole strategy away. I will try to cut the amount of money that this bill could cost out of the university's budget. How will I know what that amount is? Senator Janssen is going to bring us an A bill. When you put a specific amount of money before the Legislature, you know what to ask for in an A bill. But when you create a program that does not tell you any way to judge how much money is needed, how is Senator Janssen realistically going to fashion an A bill? If he says the A bill should contain \$2 million, what is that based on? We don't know how much this bureaucrat with the National Guard is going to determine any or all these people ought to receive. There is nothing in this statute that says every person receives the same percentage of his or her tuition. It's open-ended. The only limitation is found in the number of people who can be benefitted, and that is found in some statute, 85-505.01. That's the only limitation. So how many...I'd like to ask Senator Janssen a question.
