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SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...there are variables, right?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, yes. Yeah.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Janssen, you're recognized.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay. Senator Chambers, I've a few things to say, and then we can carry on our conversation a little further. The reason that the portion that Senator Chambers is trying to eliminate now is probably because of location of where that individual lives. If they have...most of them have jobs, even...and even go to school. So if someone was, say, at...in my district, in Fremont, rather than going either to Wayne or University of Omaha...or University of Nebraska at Omaha, or coming to Lincoln, if they...there is a college there, an independent college, they could get the tuition reimbursement, up to what that...the cost of a state school would be. So...and they couldn't get any more than that. They couldn't get the full amount of the tuition at a private school. And I think, five years ago, when we did put that in for the independent colleges, that was the reason behind it. But there would be no more money spent at that college than there would be at a state school. Now, Senator Chambers, if you'd like to keep going with what you're talking, I just wanted to get that in there. So we can carry on our conversation.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you may.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: "Thankee," Mr. President. "Thankee,"...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Senator Janssen. An A bill is going to have to have a specific dollar amount. Would you agree?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Just so we'll have a basis for discussing, do you have any idea of the total amount currently appropriated for this program? And if not, we'll take an arbitrary figure.
