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SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's what you would do.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That's the only way you could do it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, no. We can put any amount we want to in the appropriation bill.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, but there...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: We can put ten times that amount, or one-tenth that amount. Wouldn't you agree?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, yes, we could, if it's...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How long before you're going to offer an A bill?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, it all depends what (laugh) happens to this bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It will probably move to Select File. They'll do that to teach me a lesson, even if they don't like the bill. And I'll take my lumps on General File. But it just lets me know what the tone is that's set. Then I'm going to look at other bills on General File and decide what I'm going to do. There was a person who said, it is a comfort to the...it is a solace to the wretched to have companions in grief. And people popularize that by saying, misery loves company. If moving this bill puts me in misery,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute, Senator Janssen. One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I would like to have company in my misery. And the only way I can do that is to get your bills. So in order to get something out of you before your time runs out, you would ask for an amount that would fund, at 100 percent of the cost of tuition, the number of people who currently are enrolled under this program.

SENATOR JANSSEN: That is where you would start, right.
