SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Friend is going to talk about Napoleon and Wellington. Well, I have a little rhyme for him already. And I'm just waiting, I'm just waiting patiently. (Laugh) But in reality, when Senator Friend said this bill will pass, he meant it would advance, because we can't pass the bill today, but I knew exactly what he meant.
