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SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Chambers, as a rule, I don't count votes. But I believe in this case I probably have about 42.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Forty-two, you said?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, you would...we're going to put that to a test.

SENATOR JANSSEN: (Laugh) Is that enough, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, all you need is 33. That's more than enough. You ought...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, you always have to...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you ought to keep some of those off, lay them aside for something really significant.

SENATOR JANSSEN: You always have to have a little cushion in there, you know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Well, you're going to get the opportunity. You're going to see if all those 42 who may commit to you today are going to be with you when the heat is on. And then, as I wrote that little rhyme, their bills are coming up. Will you support the bill of everybody who votes for you on cloture? Will you give that guarantee?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Chambers, no, I've never given that kind of a guarantee to anybody.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You mean you're going to ask them to support you, antagonize me, and you're not promising to support them in return?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I believe that the bill has enough merit that people will support it anyway.
