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SENATOR CHAMBERS: But some of them may not have enough merit.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, I believe they will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Because some get a cloture vote, but they don't get that many votes to pass it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Good things come to those who wait.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you feel if you wait long enough you'll get 42 votes, 42, and your colleagues who vote for you cannot count on one vote from you. You see what I mean about when I characterize the intelligence level of my colleagues?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, I wasn't listening.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I just want you to help me dramatize it for them.

SENATOR JANSSEN: I wasn't listening to that portion of your speech this morning.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Well, thank you. Then that makes it even better, because you feel the same way that I feel. I'm not going to do anything else to delay or impede Senator Janssen's bill. It will die of its own lack of merit. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Don Pederson.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you. Mr. President, members, I wasn't going to speak again, but I think that we need to correct something that's been said on this floor, and the figure that was just tossed out by Senator Chambers, we might be spending \$8,000 or \$18,000 or whatever on one student. If you'll look at the language in the bill, it says that any student who gets this kind of support shall be entitled to a credit of up to 100 percent of the resident tuition charged of such school,
