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SENATOR SCHIMEK: That is correct.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Then, looking back on...well, let me stop there, Senator.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Sure.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I only have one minute. So rather than start a new subject, let me end here, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, and I'll push my button again.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, one issue that has not been addressed that I wanted to add, in terms of my support of the bill, is that the American Correctional Association has statistics that show that individuals who vote are much less likely to reoffend. Now, I suppose you could argue that those kinds of individuals who wish to participate in society, who go through the...and people are still going to have to go through the process of registering to vote in order to participate...that those people are the kinds of people who probably have learned the lesson of their time in prison, and so are more likely to move forward anyway. But I still think that this is...makes a...more of a nexus for the whole idea of rehabilitation and the relationship between voting and rehabilitation. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Louden, you're recognized.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I guess I've listened to the dialogue on this situation here for a while. And I have some questions that I'm kind of concerned about, on which people would be allowed to vote, and how it would come about. I was wondering if Senator Schimek would yield to a question, please.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Senator Schimek, will you yield?
