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palms, palpitating hearts, and panting and gaspings, as this particular part of our discussion proceeds?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, I don't believe they are.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think they're out there, though?

SENATOR JANSSEN: They're concerned. They're concerned.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, have you ever watched a program on television called The X-Files?

SENATOR JANSSEN: No, I haven't.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, there's...I guess you could call it a legend, that goes across the screen. It says, "the truth is out there." If they would be designated "the truth," could we say that the National Guard representatives are "out there" behind the glass?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes. There are representatives from the National Guard behind the glass.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, since I'm going to be dealing with this bill, if you think that they would like to have further discussions with you, they'll have that opportunity, because I'm going to take some time. Your time, my time, everybody's time. But that's all I'll ask you at this point, Senator Janssen. Thank you.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Um-hum.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, I didn't like this bill the other day. But because I didn't want an impasse to develop at that point, I agreed to just let the bill go on to this stage of debate. And I pointed out that I could do the same thing at this stage of debate that I could have done on General File. But I try, whenever I can, to be collegial and move the business of the Legislature. But there is business that I have, that I'm interested in, and now the piper must be paid. There are many people who like to go to the dance, dance
