eating people out there now and they're concerned about it. They have banned trapping in the state of Colorado. And the issue becomes, well, is it okay to trap mice? I don't know answer to that, but they have done that. And it's interesting, I'm not picking on my urban friends here, but it people in the Denver overwhelmingly supported by the metropolitan area and it was overwhelmingly opposed in the rural area. And so I think we should probably get out ahead of this. I don't see Senator Beutler, but I would like to tell you a little bit about Fred L. Morrison. Fred Morrison is considered to be the author of the constitutional amendment in Minnesota and he is an attorney. And a year ago when we discussed this briefly on the floor I was asked by one of the members of the Legislature, well, who is Fred Morrison? Well, he received his degree at the University of Kansas, and an M.A. degree at Oxford University, and a Ph.D. from Princeton University, and his J.D. degree from the University of Chicago. He has been both a Rhodes scholar and a Fulbright scholar. He taught at the University of Iowa College of Law before joining the University of Minnesota Law School faculty in 1969. Professor Morrison has also been a visiting professor at the University of Bonn and at the University of Kiel, what is that city, in Germany. served as the Counselor of International Law for the United States Department of State, and as a counsel for the United States before the International Court of Justice. He was a member of the Advisory Committee of International Law of the Department of State and a member of the States International Advisory Board, Institute for International Christian...no, I'm not reading this too right. He is a director of the American Society for the Comparative Study of Professor Morrison is also a member of the American Law Institute, the American Society of International Law, and the Board of Editors to the American Journal of Comparative Law. was also honored by the university President's Award for Outstanding Service.
