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you're not going to hear people stand on this floor and talk about the constitution, because they don't know anything about the constitution. They talk about economic development in the rural areas. How is befouling the constitution going to lend anything to economic development in the rural areas? Let these people have all the conventions that they choose. Let them dress in funny clothes. Let them spend thousands and thousands of dollars at Cabela's buying uniforms and guns that they can't shoot straight, traps they don't know how to set, angling equipment with which they can't catch a fish. But don't implicate the constitution. You don't have to do that. The mere fact that Senator Schrock reads all of this material about the nincompoop who brought the first version of this shows that the thing will not stand on its own merit. He has to tell you how great and intelligent the guy is who did this. Do you know who elaborated the first notion of a constitution? Aristotle. Aristotle, and he has a much higher intellectual standing throughout the world than this fellow that Senator Schrock read to us about. But a person who is intelligent is not intelligent in every way. Aristotle is given a lot of credit because he developed a scientific approach to knowledge. Rather than develop a lot of mental images and fanciful constructs within the mind, he observed the world around him. He would take items or animals or entities that seemed to belong to a category. He would study them, and when it appeared that they all behaved a certain way in a certain set of circumstances, he would formulate a principle that he would articulate about how these, whatever they are, would operate. But as intelligent as Aristotle was, even though he might be called the father of science, in a sense, Aristotle felt that, I don't know how you determine that an elephant had a headache, but if an elephant had a headache and you rubbed his shoulders with salt, that would cure the headache. Aristotle felt that men had more teeth than women. All he'd a had to do was count the teeth in his head, then ask Mrs. Aristotle to open her mouth and count the teeth in her head. But he didn't do it. So intelligent people are not intelligent in every way. They might lay out a scientific approach, then violate it in the most basic and fundamental ways and areas of searching. So I'm not going to be swayed because this fellow graduated from Yale or wherever he went to school. The fact that he teaches law, that means
