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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Further discussion on the Chambers amendment, FA32? Seeing no lights on, Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on FA32.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, we're going to have all the time needed to discuss every element of this proposed amendment, and as much about the constitution and the concept of a constitution as I want to discuss. been told by a couple of people that they wouldn't vote for cloture on this. Maybe others will. If you think that this is so important we should spend the amount of time on it that I want to spend, so be it. I think protecting the constitution is that important, and I'm going to fight it. Senator Stuhr had to go all the way across the ocean to England to find a situation where what she called a sporting event was outlawed. And what is this sporting event? Fox chasing, fox slaughtering. are animals that have what they call a hot scent, so they get their packs of hounds of the four-footed variety, and the hounds of the two-footed variety, with due apology to every member of the canine family but sometimes analogies have to be drawn, so I apologize to all members of the canine family, but they would understand. The two-footed hounds find it exhilarating and thrilling to set those packs of dogs after a small animal. have their guns. They "yippety-yap" and run these horses and that's called sport. What kind of men and women would call that That is uplifting? Why, that goes back to the savagery of the early days in England when they lived in caves and painted themselves blue and cut themselves. And that is to be As we go along, I'm going to talk about the fact that England has no constitution. Parliament is supreme. states that have written constitutions, there generally is a provision that the courts will be a restraining influence on the legislative body. Senator Schrock talked about these small horses which he would not ride because of his stature and weight. He didn't say weight, but I thought I'd throw that in. And these horses are mean. Why are they mean? Because they don't want to be treated like the docile, enslaved animal that he has broken to his will and destroyed in terms of its native wildness.
