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to speak.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Janssen, there's an old pioneer cemetery in Richardson County. There's more than one. But the one I'm thinking of has slowly, over the last 40 years, become overgrown. The stones have been stolen. And now, today, can barely identify that it was a cemetery at all. It's really one of the saddest situations that I know about with regard to these old cemeteries. And the last time I went up there, I couldn't find a single marker. I don't know if it's kids, or farmers using them for weights on their plows, or whatever. But never could find out--and I didn't search as deeply as I should have, I suppose--but I never did find out who is responsible for maintaining that cemetery. And I guess just a curious question to you would be, is there somebody responsible for taking care of all these old pioneer cemeteries? Or are they oftentimes in the hands of a benevolent landowner who takes care of them just kind of on his or her own? And will this registry pick up those kinds of things, in the sense that if they're not being...if they haven't been identified by a city, a village, or a county, as this one apparently was not, because nobody was taking care of it ... and it was fairly large at the beginning. There was at least 100 markers there. Or is it just hopeless trying to go back and identify some of these, and being sure they're all on the register and cared for? That's a lot of questions.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Okay.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But I'd be interested in your narrative on that.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right. Okay. Yeah, Senator...

SENATOR JENSEN: Senator Janssen, would you respond?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Yes, I will. This has been one of the problems, Senator Beutler. Not only do we have these locations throughout the state, but there are some times when they are landowners that are running center pivots over the top of those cemeteries also. And this is what was the concern by the State
