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affect the number of people who are uninsured and who are going to become eligible for Medicaid. There is one instance right there that can affect that, and there are a number of others where you can...you have an influence. Population, we look at our population being 1,700,000, versus some of...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: One minute.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Thank you, Senator Byars. That does start. I just want to say in closing I'm on both sides of the issue of demanding business have health insurance. I do think some businesses probably should be and could be affording health insurance, but, by and large, when you're in business for yourself, it's a difficult row to hoe. Now only is it difficult to make ends meet in terms of learning the business and having that, but in most cases there's enormous risk. And so I don't automatically, at least, blame small businesses particularly for not having health insurance when they're barely making it themselves. I think most of us in agriculture probably provide it to our family members in the business, and maybe, and maybe not, provide it to our employees. But to put a huge burden on business, particularly small business,...

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Time.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...to provide health insurance is not an automatic with me. Thank you.

PRESIDENT SHEEHY: Thank you, Senator. Senator Beutler, followed by Senator Chambers, Senators Erdman, Janssen, and Byars. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I just wanted to go through quickly the other factors or causes of the problem that I didn't get a chance to speak of last time, and I hope I can mention the other four or five now just so that we've kind of laid out there, at least to the extent of my awareness of causes, the things that we should also be talking about. I think what scares Senator Byars is that this study, the way it's framed, the things that will be
